

Driver Licensing Survey Under Way In Oakland Cty.

A survey of driver licensing in Oakland County is being made to determine if a need exists for additional driver license examination bureaus to serve people residing in the townships outside of cities or municipalities where bureaus now exist. Sheriff Clare L. Hubbell announced this week. Driver license bureaus presently are being maintained in several parts of the county but the absence of bureaus to serve the growing population in the townships has pointed up a possible need for additional ones, the sheriff said. "The driver license law provides that only chiefs of police may examine in cities or municipalities having organized police departments and only the sheriff can examine persons living outside of such cities or municipalities," the sheriff said. "In addition, the rules and regulations governing the examination of persons for operator or chauffeur licenses provide that only full time regular employees of a police or sheriff department can be named as examiners."

"THIS ELIMINATES the possibility of part time special deputies doing the work, and the rule was adopted after months of study by police and other interested organizations as the best means of doing the best job possible in the field of driver licensing. It permits positive control over the examiners." The sheriff said he has had several conferences with Owen J. Cleary, secretary of state who is charged with the responsibility of administration and enforcement of the driver licensing laws through a new law effective last October 2, and Cleary strongly encouraged.

Call Tax Revision A Victory for U.S. Consumers

Congressman George A. Dondero this week said tax experts in Congress are halting the federal tax revision bills, one of which has passed the House and the other is scheduled for action this week, as a victory for American consumers. "The excise tax reduction bill, which passed the House on March 10," said Congressman Dondero, "cuts in half the excises on handbags, toilet preparations, furs, jewelry, light bulbs and admissions. It also reduces the taxes on telephone calls." "More than a year ago it was my privilege to initiate the move for tax relief on many of the articles mentioned; taxes which long have made it difficult for housewives to balance their family budgets. I viewed the House action on this tax-cutting bill with much personal satisfaction."

"THIS WEEK the omnibus bill for general revision of the federal taxes will come up in the House. As reported out by the ways and means committee, this bill closes 50 tax loopholes and removes tax inequities, to the end that individual initiative will be encouraged, and the national economy stimulated." "According to committee figures," Dondero pointed out, "this bill in effect will hand back to consumers, and not to corporations, about \$778 million out of the total tax savings of \$1.4 billion. But this \$1.4 billion loss in federal revenue will be almost entirely made up by the \$1.2 billion in revenue gained by extending corporate income taxes at 52 percent instead of permitting them to fall to 47 percent as the present law requires." "When this \$778 million of funds, made available for expenditure by consumers, is added to the approximate \$1 billion excise tax reduction bill, and to the \$3 billion provided by the personal income tax reduction effective this year, it appears that consumers soon may be better off by nearly \$5 billion."
