Under the baton of Victor Kolar, the Detroit Women's Symphony orchestra will present its second and final concert of the year on April 26, featuring Emily Muttter Adams, concertmistress. The program will be heard at 8:30 p. m. at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Miss Adams began studying violin when she was four years old, receiving her early training from her father. Later she studied in Ann Arbor and Chicago, where she was a protegee of the noted conductor, Frederick Stock. She has also worked extensively with Jacques Goddon, Michael Pressa and Ilya Schkolnik.

A member of the Detroit Symphony for several years, she has been featured soloist for this group since 1948. She has also worked with the Chicago Symphony

on numerous programs. SHE HAS made extensive radio and television appearances as well as concerting in the mid-west. Member of WXYZ's radio staff for two years, she has been heard of the violin department of Michigan State Normal college for an even longer time. For her appearance next Friday evening, she will be featured in Mozart's Concert No. 5 in A Major, and "Rondo Capriccioso" by Saint-Saens.
