

# All Must Re-register On Forthcoming Vote of Franklin Village Charter

FRANKLIN VILLAGE—Previous registration for township, county, state and national elections does not entitle the citizens of the Intended Village of Franklin to vote on the proposed charter in mid-June, according to Stanley Krentel, secretary of the charter commission.

All who expect to vote at that time on the charter and for the new village officials must register at the Village Nursery School on Franklin on one of the following occasions:

- Saturday, April 24 or Saturday, May 1—10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.
- Monday, April 26; Friday, April 30; Monday, May 3; or Friday, May 7—7:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Returned from the Governor's office some time ago in need of minor amendments, the charter as rewritten was discussed at a public meeting held at the Franklin Community Hall last week, Thursday, and is being referred for final action to the governor. Candidates for the various village offices will be named at the filing of petitions with Stanley Krentel.

The intent of the proposed charter is to establish as a home rule village, with a president and six

## Is Guest Soloist For May Musicales

Guest soloist at the May 13 program of the Birmingham Musicales, John Mathews, doubles bass, will introduce "The Diversion for Double Bass and Piano."

This number was written especially for the young Birmingham musician by Clark Eastman, nationally known Royal Oak composer and fellowship student of Roy Harris and Ernest Krenek.

Mathews, who has spent most of his life in Birmingham, is a graduate of Baldwin high school. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fenton Mathews of 5900 Adams road, are both musicians. Mrs. Mathews is a singer and piano teacher, her husband a pianist and violinist.

Young Mathews has been a member of the Dallas, Houston and Seattle Symphonies and was first desk double bass with the Baltimore Symphony. Currently he is associated with the Detroit Symphony, and has appeared as soloist with the Detroit Fiddlers band.

HE HAS studied with Gaston Brehm, virtuoso first desk bass, who has been with the Detroit Symphony for 22 years.  
He was a scholarship student in music at Wayne university and the Peabody conservatory where he studied chamber music with William Knoll and orchestration with Ferd Grofe.  
Mathews will be accompanied at the piano by Dorothy Gillon.  
In addition to the guest soloist, the program will feature several selections by the Madrigal Singers. Mrs. Harold Walker will direct the group she organized five years ago. The Singers will perform in costume, singing 15th and 16th century songs written by Purcell, Scaratti, Festa, Morley and Tosti.
