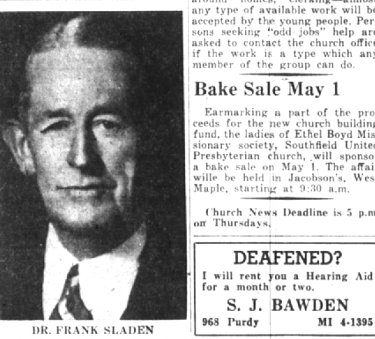
Doctor to Speak As Methodist Men Entertain Wives

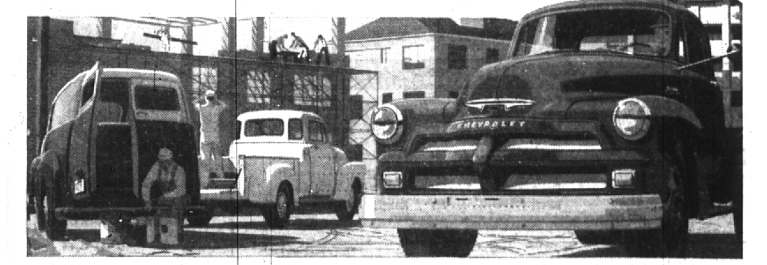
