

### American Dances, Winter Athletes To Be Theme Of Jr. Glee Club

"Pageant of American Music", an original collection of songs and dances associated with the nation's history, will be presented by the Junior Glee Club of Kingswood School, Brookwood at 8:15 p.m. Friday, April 30.

Songs selected from folk archives by Lohr Chapman have been related into a narrative by Elizabeth Bennett, with thematic dances arranged by Elizabeth Bethune.

Musical episodes deal with the Indians, the Pilgrims, the Revolution, the westward migration, post-Civil War, and the 20th century to the works of George Gershwin. Historical costumes are being made by the mothers of 10th grade girls and will be donated permanently to the school wardrobe.

### Stage Building Part of Theatre School Course

Basic stage construction, including building a new set each week, will be the order of the day at the new Summer Theatre in a new course offered to boys from 12 to 17 by the staff of the Theatre School, under Fred Bornhoft, technical director.

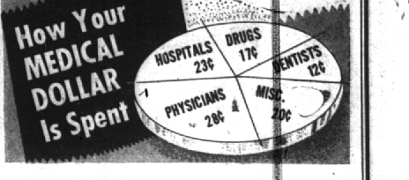
Boys enrolled in the course will learn basic carpentry and stage design, and will be given practical work on stage lighting. In addition, they will participate in the Theatre School's regular program which involves voice, pantomime, body work and general technique of theatre.

Swimming in Cranbrook's Jonah pool will be available to complete the all-day program which, for members of this course will run the full length of the Theatre School, about seven and one-half weeks. No more than a dozen boys will be selected for the course in stage construction and lighting.

Besides Mr. Bornhoft, instructors will be William Hollingsworth, Head of Dramatics at Cooley High School, and Carl G. Womberger, Director of the Theatre School. The entire Theatre School includes a staff of twenty-six professional actors, teachers and technicians.

Enrollments for boys in the Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills area will be accepted until May 15.
