## City Schedules Bid Taking For Summer Paving

In order to get Birmingham's summer street paving program underway as soon as possible the city will receive bids on the program May 5, according to City Engineer L. R. Gare.

Two miles of streets are slated to be paved at an estimated total cost of \$292,000.

Biggest project in the program is the widening and repaving of W. Maple from Linden to a point just west of Glenhurst. An expected cost of \$138,000 will be shared by the city, Oakland county, and benefited business property owners, Gare said.

The present pavement will be completely torn out along the portion to be widened and the new pavement—44 feet wide—will follow a route slightly to the north of the present roadway from Linden to Chestersfield.

**THIS WILL** provide an improved and wider parkway on the south side of the street, and alleviate the abruptness of the curve in Maple near the Linden intersection.

Included in the Maple widening will be the paving of Chestersfield for 200 feet north of Maple and the paving of the alley behind the Chestersfield-Maple business section. This cost is estimated at \$11,900.

Also to be paved is Pierce street from Lincoln to 14th at an estimated cost of \$59,961. Combined cost of paving Southlawn from Pierce to Washington and Northlawn from Pierce to Bates is expected to be about \$25,400.

**PAVING** the extension of Derby road from Exon to Coddridge will cost about \$49,056.

Also to be bid on is the paving of Edmondrough and St. Andrews for 200 feet north of Maple and a possible cost of \$7,450.

Actually, plans to pave St. Andrews and Armstrong, and parts of Edmondrough and Pembroke area residents decide if they will be feasible to vacate St. Andrews to block future traffic from north of the city from going through the Pembroke area.

**Costs** of paving neighborhood streets will be defrayed through special assessments to beneficiaries, property owners.

**PLANS** for construction of new sewer and water facilities this summer still are tentative, Gare said.

Plans for development of the recently annexed Porritt property are approved, there will be a good deal of work done in that area.
