

### Residents Okay City Plan Board Traffic Proposal

A proposal by the Birmingham planning board, designed to forestall future traffic problems in the Pembroke area, was approved Tuesday night by a representative group of Pembroke area residents at an informal meeting with plan board members.

The plan advises vacations of St. Andrews from Pembroke to Derby and of Edmundo from Buckingham to Windemere.

Such a move would prevent their use as through streets from Maple to Derby thus removing the possibility that future large scale home building to the north in Troy township could threaten the neighborhood with traffic congestion, planners believe.
