

East Beverly Resident Chairman of County's Polio Vaccine Program

EAST BEVERLY—Of considerable interest to parents of this area, as well as parents throughout Birmingham, will be the coming of the Polio Vaccine Field Trials in the Birmingham schools the week of May 3. Of particular interest to this region is the fact that Mrs. Howard Riemann of Glencoe is the Vaccine Volunteer chairman for all of Oakland County. Her appointment came as the outgrowth of her recent chairmanship of the March of Dimes of Birmingham.

Under Mrs. Riemann's supervision are five committees which have been organizing the vaccine testing program, which is sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Under these chairmen are the tireless volunteers who carry on the job of transporting supplies, recording all necessary data, administering school clinical assistance and parental contact, and those giving shots.

At this writing, the results of parent permission responses were incomplete due to the vacations of our schools, but there was some indication that the Birmingham response would run a little better than 50 per cent in favor of the testing.

half of the children will receive injections of a controlled substance, while the other half will receive injections of the Salk vaccine. Mrs. Riemann is very hopeful that at least 25,000 children in Oakland County will receive the shots. This approximate number is essential in order that worthwhile results be derived from the testing.

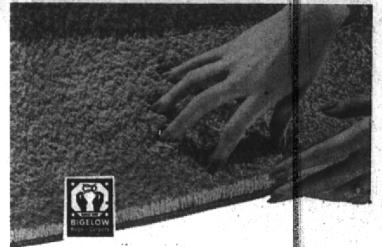

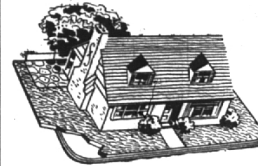
