### B'ham Students Represent U. S. In Mock United Nations Session

Representing the United States and battling Russian propaganda were five Birmingham high school delegates who attended the fifth model United Nations assembly at Hillsdale college April 2 and 3.

Arriving prepared to discuss issues and argue points were members from 63 Michigan high schools, each of which represented a country in the United Nations. Some schools were present only as observers.

Representing the two big blocs were Birmingham high school, the United States, and Flint Northern high school, Russia. Birmingham delegates were Joan Gassoway, Jim Gillen, Cherry Harris, Bob Paulus, and Carolyn Shattuck. George A. Miller accompanied the group as advisor.

WITH THE sounding of the gavel at 12:30 p.m. and grinding of movie cameras the first session of the General Assembly at the fifth annual model U. N. assembly came to order.

Officers were elected and various international issues discussed. The meeting was adjourned for more detailed discussion of these issues in committee.

Standing committees and councils were the political and social committees, ad hoc committee, Security council, Economic and social council and the Trusteeship council.

The United States delegation was represented in committees by Carolyn Shattuck, Political and social committee; Bob Paulus, ad hoc political committee; Cherry Harris, Economic and social council; Jim Gillen, Trusteeship council; and Joan Gassoway, president of the Security council.

COMMITTEE meetings recessed at 5:30. A banquet was sponsored for all delegates by Rotary international. Following dinner an address was given by Rev. Archibald J. Carey, minister of the first African Baptist church of Chicago, and sixth alternate delegate to the U. N. eighth general assembly.

The United States delegation was in a festive mood, dancing and relaxation occupied the rest of the evening's schedule.

At 8:30 the next morning sleepy-eyed delegates arrived in the committee rooms for meetings until 10:30.

Committees adjourned to convene at the church for the second session of the general States assembly.

Issues reported out favorably from committees were discussed and voted upon. As well as Russia and the United States exchanged many comments.
