

Saturday Bride Carries Heirloom Handkerchief

In a double-ring ceremony in the First Presbyterian church on Saturday afternoon, Helen Louise Woolson became the bride of William Plevich. The vows were heard by the Rev. W. Glen Harris at 4 p.m. before 300 wedding guests.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Irving Woolson, 715 Gleggery road. Her husband's parents are Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Plevich of Brooklyn, N. Y.

Helen's gown was fashioned with a rose point lace bodice, long sleeves and the skirt consisted of layers of tulle over satin forming a chapel train. The illusion neckline was appliqued with lace, studded with rhinestones and pearls, and the same motif was repeated in garland effect on the skirt. The headpiece, holding a fingertip veil of illusion, carried out the medieval theme with tiny loops of pearls falling from a lace plateau. She carried an arrangement of stephanotis and fufi mums on a prayer book.

The bride carried an heirloom lace handkerchief more than 175 years old. She is the sixth generation bride in her mother's family to carry this handkerchief, which was part of the trousseau of its first owner.

HONOR attendant was Mrs. James E. Woolson of Schenectady, N.Y. Acting as bridesmaids were Donna Puls and Beverly Yates, both of Birmingham. Mary Ann Kane of Cortland, N.Y. and Mary Plevich of Brooklyn, sister of the groom.

Attendants were gowned alike in white length, anatomic green chiffon frocks, fashioned with cowl necklines ending in long draped chas in the back. They wore circlets of flowers in plateau style in their hair and carried bouquets of baby mums shading from yellow to bronze.

George Plevich of Brooklyn, N. Y., was his brother's best man. Seating the guests were James E. Woolson of Schenectady, N. Y., brother of the bride, Russell N. Chapman, Jr., of Huntington Woods, Robert Phillips of Fitchburg, Mass., and Harry H. Simanek.

THE BRIDE'S mother attended the wedding and reception, following at the Detroit Golf club, in an afternoon length dress of toast chantilly lace over champagne taffeta, with a brown velvet accent and a matching hat. Her flowers were cypripedium orchids. Mrs. Plevich chose a navy afternoon dress with pink accessories and had a corsage of robin hills.
