**Central Bureau Will Register Volunteer Help**

The establishment of a Central Volunteer Bureau for the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills-Pontiac area will be completed soon. Mrs. Lucile Dennison of Birmingham recently completed a survey under the sponsorship of the Pontiac area United Fund to show the necessity of such a group.

As outlined before a group of women last week, she said the bureau is to provide a focal point where persons may register for volunteer services and where agencies may seek help.

"Many persons are willing and eager to give some of their spare time in this type of service," Mrs. Dennison said, "and surely there is a deep need for such workers."

"The bureau will serve 20 different child care, social, health and recreation agencies which, our survey shows, are seeking volunteer help. This number includes tax-supported as well as voluntary organizations," she continued.

"THE POSTS available cover a wide range of interests from the specialized skills in hobby and craft work to a demand for part-day jobs needing no particular

training. The latter are often the most urgently needed and hardest to get."

Mrs. Dennison said the survey showed the greatest need for volunteer workers is among young and old people. Request for office workers ran a close second.

She said these were paralleled by the need for volunteer drivers, those who will transport ill or handicapped children and adults to doctors, clinics, schools and the like.

AMONG THE more specialized workers are those who can direct water printing, photography as a hobby, music leaders and grades enthusiasts, assistants in routine hospital work and volunteers who will read to small children in institutions.

Mrs. Dennison said an advisory committee would be named shortly with the hope that the bureau can go into operation shortly after the first of the month.

Area women attending the Pontiac meeting included Mrs. Rudolph Eberstadt, Jr., Birmingham, and Mrs. Edward A. Proctor, Wing Lake.

Mrs. Dennison said she was already enrolling volunteers at the UF headquarters in Pontiac, even though the bureau is not officially in action.

**Tomato Jam**  
6 lbs. ripe tomatoes  
1 lb. raisins  
3 lbs. brown sugar  
1 pint vinegar  
1 tablespoon salt  
2 tablespoons cinnamon  
1 tablespoon cloves  
1/8 nutmeg grated.  
1/2 teaspoon black pepper  
Scald and peel tomatoes. Chop raisins, then combine all ingredients. Cook slowly for 2 hours and pack in jars that have been sterilized.

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
