Dog Pound Repainted

Hired a month ago as the city's full time dog warden, George Grenke has just completed the repainting of the reopened city dog pound in the DPV garage. The six-month experiment of keeping the impounded pooches at a local veterinarian proved "a little more expensive" to the city than having a city pound, Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said.

Dogs, running at large, are picked up and taken to the pound. Impounded dogs are kept in the newly repainted city pound for three days and then disposed of, unless the dog is valuable, Moxley said.

A DOG OWNER PAYS \$5, plus \$1.50 board for each day, to reclaim his dog, the chief said. Hours for claiming a dog are from 8 to 8:30 a.m., 12:30 to 1 p.m. and 4 to 4:30 p.m.

Dogs who have bitten people and who are rabid, are kept in separate cages. Such dogs are impounded for 15 days. If the dog is found to have rabies, the person who was bitten is asked to obtain preventative rabies shots.

1st Six Months' Injury Totals Show Reductions

Unusual as it may seem, a reduction in both traffic deaths and injuries was recorded in Michigan in the first six months of 1954. A slight increase in accidents was accounted for at least in part by improved reporting. This encouraging information was disclosed in the state police monthly statistical report, which showed that in June there was a decrease of 46 deaths, or 27 per cent, under the same month last year.

There were 127 persons killed and 4,743 injured in 14,408 accidents as compared to 173 killed and 4,952 injured in 14,515 accidents in June of 1953.

MOST OF the June fatality reduction was in the rural areas and was attributed to a decrease in collisions between vehicles and ran-off-roadway accidents.

May was the only month during the first half of the year that showed an increase of deaths, 152 being killed or 25 more than in June.

The totals for the first six months reveal a reduction of 82, or 10 per cent, in deaths and 923, or four per cent, in injuries. Reported accidents increased 1,791, or two per cent.

Estimated mileage traveled during the first five months, the latest figures available, was 10.5 billion, an increase of four per cent over 10.1 billion in the same period last year. The death rate of 5.8 per 100 million miles was down 11 per cent.

Can Build Garage

Petition by Frank Pero, 1491 S. Eton, to build a garage on his property with less than the required 15-foot setback was granted by Birmingham zone board of appeals at its August 3 meeting. Neighbors voiced no objections. The triangular shape of his property necessitated his request, he explained.

ORDINANCE NO. 469 CITY OF BIRMINGHAM AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 221

An Ordinance to Amend Section 301 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 221 of the City of Birmingham, by the addition of sections to be known as Sections 301.37, 301.38, 301.39, 301.40, 301.41, 301.42 and 301.43.

That Section 301 of Article 3 of Ordinance No. 221 be amended by the addition of a Section to be known as Section 301.37-Property described as follows:

SECTION 301.37-Property described as the north 15 feet of the east 78.2 feet of lot 6 of Block 2, Subdivision of Lots 40, 41, 42 and part of Lot 43 of Wilcox Addition, T. 18 N. R. 9 E.

shall be reclassified from its present classification of "Parking B" district, to "Parking A" district. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication after the passage hereof.
