

Detroit Waives Examination Here

A 38-year-old Detroit man was arraigned before Birmingham Justice John J. Gaffl Friday last week on a charge of possession of stolen goods from a Birmingham store. He demanded examination and his case was set for Sept. 8. The man, David Berry, Detroit, was released after posting \$500 bond.

The complaint was made by D. J. Healy Shops of 254 W. Maple. The stolen goods, consisting of two dresses, are valued at about \$80. When Berry was apprehended August 7 by Detroit police on information furnished by Birmingham police, he had other merchandise in his possession, according to Birmingham Detect. Lt. Merlin Holmquist. Berry told police that he paid \$15 for the Birmingham goods, they stated.
