

Community House Sets Hobby Class Openings

With the opening of the Community House for the fall and winter season plans are already completed for the crafts and hobby classes' first term.

Several changes have been made in the coming program, perhaps the most important being the "Tips for Teens" group which will be directed by Mrs. James E. MacLane.

A resident of Birmingham since 1950, Mrs. MacLane is a native of Germany. She is a professional photographer, television and commercial film actress and a member of the Detroit chapter, American Federation of Television and Radio Artists.

She has modeled for photographers in Paris and worked with Christian Dior, along with commercial work with many metropolitan area concerns.

With this background and a constant study of fashions and fashion design, department store appearance, speech, hair dressing and makeup, she will conduct personalized lessons for high school girls. Walking, talking, dancing, dating, fashions, frills and fun will be the basis of her class.

Classes will be held each Thursday evening from 7 to 8:30. A SECOND new class will be on European Travel, taught by Miss Kathryn Myers, a regular instructor at the Kingswood school, Cranbrook, in the French and Spanish department.

Her many travels through Europe and residency there will be passed on to members of this Thursday evening, 8 to 9:30 group. A smattering of French, Spanish and Italian will be given, based on Mrs. Myers' knowledge, and to be the most needed bits of language to the American abroad.

Mrs. Thelma Anderson will teach the two bridge classes, one from 8 to 10 p.m., Mondays, the other from 10 to 11:30 p.m., Wednesdays. A "staff" member for three years, Mrs. Anderson will offer a complete course on all phases of the game. A question period and rubber bridge will be planned. The course runs 10 weeks.

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HER COURSE includes a study and making of ceramics, from the beginning to the finished piece. The particular uses to which ceramics can be put and a stimulation of latent talent. Firing, finishing and color will be included, too.

Under the direction of Peter Joseph Duenas, noted designer, a class in this field will be held from 1-3 p.m., each Monday for 10 weeks.

Duenas will have an advance course in the fundamental elements of design and composition, line, texture, volume, form, value and color. Enrollees must have had a previous design course or art work.

Mrs. Anderson's classes in enameling will run for 10 weeks, outlining instruction in pattern, glaze applications and firing. All types of enamelled work will be handled. Classes are Wednesdays, 1-4 p.m., and Fridays at the same hours.

MRS. ANDERSON teaches at Cass high school evenings and for the Detroit Edison company. She has taught silversmithing at the Community House for seven years. The free lance writing class, under the direction of Alice E. Morgan, is another 10 week session, running Thursday evenings from 8-10. It will consist of a general course, including publicity writing, the factual article and fiction.

Mrs. Morgan has been with The Birmingham Eccentric for seven years and is starting her third year with the House. She has had previous experience in eastern weeklies and dailies and in the fiction field.

Mrs. Alice Burlingame will again conduct her class in gardening, stressing house plants. This three weeks course has 9:30-11:30 a.m. classes each Wednesday.

ANOTHER 10 week course in the interior decorating workshop which Mrs. Gay Yankee will conduct from 1-3 p.m., Thursdays.

Field trips to learn drapery making as well as to furniture and rug manufacturing places will be a part of this course. Motion pictures will be shown to illustrate decorating problems.

Milinery will once more be under the direction of Mrs. Pat Cuccchi. Classes will be for six weeks. One group will meet from noon to 3 p.m., Mondays, another from 9 a.m. to noon on Tuesday.

Instruction will include making new hats and remodeling old ones. Under Mrs. Sue Kline, three Monday classes in sculpture will meet for 10 weeks, hours are 9-10 p.m. to noon, 1-4 p.m., and 8-10 p.m.

A thorough knowledge of techniques, creative possibilities and other forms of clay modeling will be given.

Painting classes will have two instructors, with the course running for 10 weeks. Mrs. Kathleen Birch will have groups on Wednesday, 1-3 p.m., 8-10 p.m., and Friday from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m. Thursday classes will be taught from 8-10 p.m. by Keith Whitmore.

Both instructors are well known artists and will teach the fundamentals of painting and drawing. In these groups individual instruction is the key note, with members encouraged to experiment freely to develop their own style.

Individual help with new garments will be given by Mrs. Bee Roach in her sewing classes which are for six weeks, Monday, 9 a.m. to noon, and Tuesday from 7-10 p.m.

Mrs. Roach will continue her policy of stressing the latest techniques and short cuts in dressmak-

The original Kappa Alpha Theta chapter at Albion was established in 1887 and its charter withdrawn by the national council in 1908. In its 21 years as an active group, it had secured as members many alumnae who have continued to function as a significant organization during the intervening 46 years. A loan fund for worthy women students at Albion has been maintained and annual reunions have been held during the years.

FOUNDED IN 1870, the national organization of Kappa Alpha Theta has 78 chapters throughout the United States and a membership of 4,912. National headquarters are in Chicago.
