

40 New Teachers Added To B'ham District

When the Birmingham School District opens for business in early September a total of 295 teachers will be in their various classrooms.

When the schools closed last June 255 teachers were in the school system, which results in 40 additional teachers having been hired since then.

Because 20 of last year's teachers resigned, Supt. Ireland has had to find a total of 60 new faculty members to complete his roster of teachers.

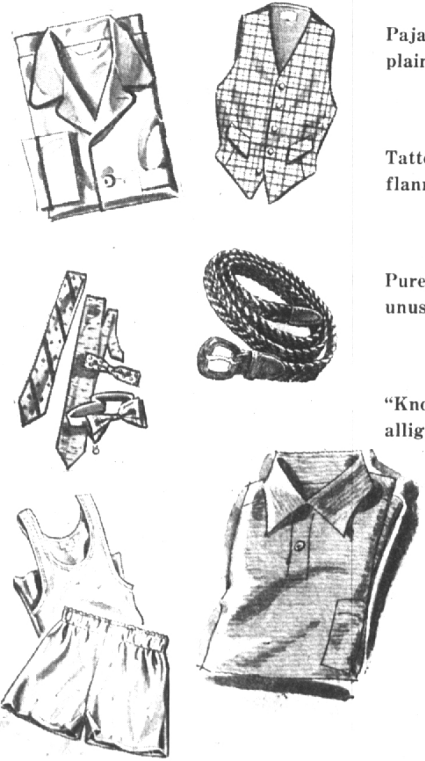
