Completes Training

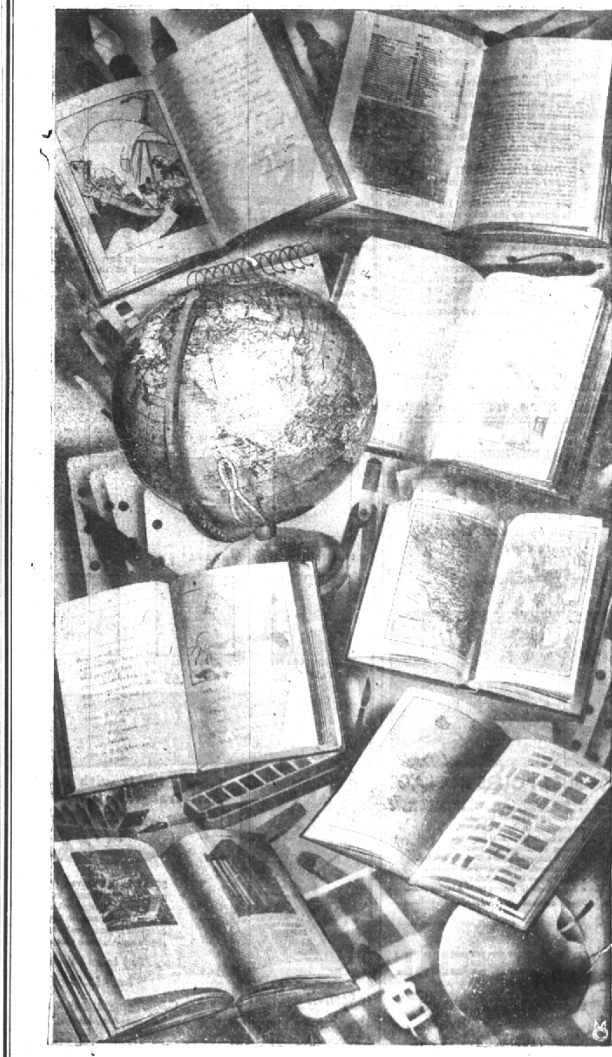
