Edison, Albans Win To Stay in Playoffs

Albans made it 6 to 1 in the fourth on a hit batonon, a double by Roth, and error and a single by Carahan.

Reeves came back short in the fifth on singles by Gillette, Bosborough, and Moses, and three Albans errors to end it 6 to 2. The win for Albans kept them alive, and the loss for Reeves put them out of the playoffs.

A week ago tonight, August 19, Edison met Michigan Bell, and Albans met Electronic Service.

BELL AND Edison tied, 1 to 1, and will replay the game. Bell scored in the second on a single by Duffy, and two infield outs. Petretis gave up four hits and struck out 11 for Edison. McBride gave up five hits for Bell.

Albans, who lost a chance for the regular season championship when a tie game with Electronics was not replayed, met the champs at St. James. This was the game they wanted to win and they did, 2-2.

Wins Adercraft Prize

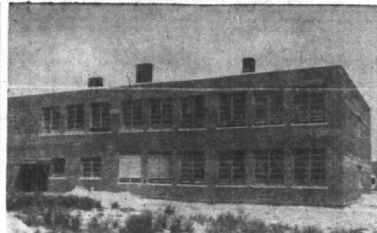
