On Dec. 7, the Past Noble Grand lodge will meet at noon for a pot luck luncheon at the home of Mrs. L. Nixon, Beverly road.

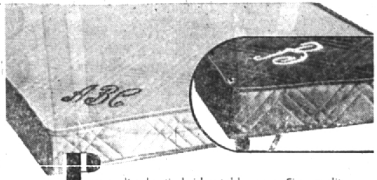
### Child Study Club

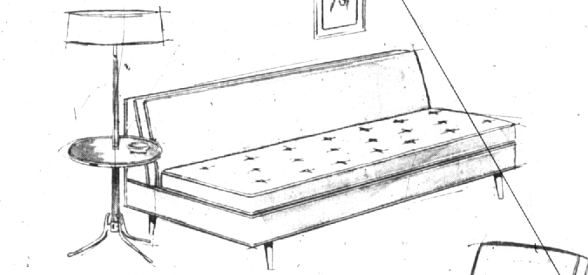
