Incinerator's Opening Will Bring Few Changes

Residents will experience little change when operations are started at the South Oklawaha County garbage and rubbish incinerator in the near future. The same collection schedule will be continued by the city and the types of material accepted by trucks for disposal will be substantially the same materials that have been collected in the past year. Refuse will be separated into two groups at the incinerator—combustible and non-combustible—but this will have little effect on the contents of the refuse container that residents will place at the curb. The incinerator, by accepting both garbage and combustible rubbish, needs no fuel and all-normal household rubbish can be placed into the furnaces. **OTHER NON-COMBUSTIBLES** and materials too dangerous to be incinerated will be disposed of in the sanitary land-fill operations on the incinerator's 48 acre site in Royal Oak township. Restrictions on the amount of ashes that can be disposed of along with other household rubbish are not expected to be felt here in the city. Department of Public Works Superintendent Robert Kenning states: "Last experience with the rubbish pickups have led city officials to believe that ashes from the city will be less than the percentage figures acceptable at the incinerator with the normal collections, eliminating the need for a special collection. THE NEWSPAPER pickup arrangement with the Salvation Army will continue here. Any refuse, however, that is be-

lieved to be explosive in nature, should not be placed with rubbish for incinerator disposal. Large amounts of sawdust, partly-filled paint and cleaner cans, gasoline, kerosene, asphalt or tar products will be picked up by the city on a call to the DPW. Discarded wood tree limbs, boxes or any other bulky rubbish must be restricted to a size no more than three feet in length. Where foresters have cut down trees or large tree limbs, the forester should dispose of the wood. Other bulky items, such as furniture, bed springs and the like that cannot be broken up will also be collected by the city on a call basis. While the authority is readying the huge plant for operation, they also are taking a second look at the sanitary land fill results at Birmingham's dump on east Maple to plan the workings of incinerator's land fill dump. **CITY OFFICIALS**, as well as authority members, are pleased with the new look at the long-cluttered Walker gravel pit, used by most authority members during the past 18 months for disposal of both garbage and rubbish. Working in 12-foot deep trenches, refuse from most of the surrounding communities has filled the low dump land to an even grade even with surrounding property and the authority has seeded the major portion of the new land. 
Y Teenage Square Dance December 11
