Federal Budget To Be Discussed By LWV Speaker

Sponsored by the Birmingham League of Women Voters, Dr. Louis L. Friedland will try to bring the "astronomical figures" of the federal budget nearer to the understanding of the layman when he speaks here on Feb. 15. Dr. Friedland, formerly of the federal bureau of the budget, is now an associate professor of public administration at Wayne university. He will center his attention on the main points of essential expenditures in his appearance here, speaking of both civil and military spending. He will also speak on the possibilities of paring down government waste.

FOLLOWING his half-hour talk, starting at 1:15 in the Community House, the meeting will be through

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open for an audience participation question and answer period.
Among Dr. Friedland's many activities is his concern with the projected new Oakland county court house which will be on consideration for the public during the August primaries.
He has been working for some time as a consultant on the fiscal aspects of the plan, considering both budgeting of expenses and methods of financing the building. He will answer questions concerning this proposal, also.
AFTER graduation from the Universities of Wisconsin and Cincinnati, Dr. Friedland became associated with the management office for the City of Cincinnati, working on personnel and budget management problems.
For seven years, beginning in 1940, he was organization and methods chairman for the federal government. He came to Wayne in 1947 in the public administration department and has frequently served as consultant for municipalities in the greater Detroit area.

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
