VanDusen Wins Third District Seat

resentative's seat in last Thursday's special election.

With a total vote of 1,782 to 838 for his opponent John C. Westerdale, Van Dusen will take the state legislator's seat vacated by Howard R. Estes, Republican from Eirmingham, as soon as the official canvass of the balloting is made. A margin of 779 votes given the young Birmingham resident in the city's balloting was nearly his margin of victory while Democratic votes in this area doubled the party's primary efforts and quadrupled Westerdale's backing in the primary. Birmingham residents supported the Detroit attorney and active leader in county Republican activities by a 907 to 128 vote.

IN THE CITY of Bloomfield Hills only three votes went to Westerdale with 75 being counted for VanDusen. Bloomfield township residents registered 187 votes for VanDusen with 14 for Westerdale. In Troy the results were much closer with a 119 to 80 victory for VanDusen.

Besides Troy, Westerdale's greatest backing came from Commerce township, his home grounds, and West Bloomfield

VanDusen, who is 28 years old and lives at 1722 Pine, has been chairman of the Birmingham Republican Club until recently and has been chairman of the third district's Republican organization and the Oakland County Republican group since 1952.
