

One In, One Out Of City Election

Carl F. Ingraham, 940 Harmon, Birmingham attorney, has taken his hat out of the city commission race this year in favor of work with the Family Service of Oakland County.

Recent interest in the lack of teen age recreational facilities locally and in the rest of the county and his nomination as president of the FSCC prompted Ingraham to make his decision.

Meanwhile, petitions are being circulated for George W. Mullin, 1420 Buckingham.

Other candidates are Commissioner James C. Allen, Harry D. Wise, Jr., Robert S. Owen is still undecided as to his candidacy.

The Birmingham city clerk's office will be open for the next three Saturday mornings, February 20 and 27 and March 6, for registration of voters for the April 5 city election.

"PRUDEN SAID there are about 50 private cars in the county equipped with two-way radio and many available to lend a hand from nearby areas.

With the first impact of the disaster past, and the squads in operation caring for victims, the committee would move into the survey field.

Damaged property would be surveyed under a program of repair and rebuilding set in motion. Assistance would be provided for those who needed it and this project set in motion.

"These are general assignments," Pruden said. "There are some features of the plan which stand entirely with the cities and townships."

"THEY WOULD be expected to provide a means of warning the people here the disaster struck, and, if time permitted, getting them out of the danger area."

The local fire departments will have the job of going into the area immediately to rescue the injured and stop the destruction fire.

Police departments would be on the scene immediately. Their job would be to help with rescue work, prevent looting and direct traffic for the area.

"BEHIND ALL this and working closely with every group, would be the Red Cross and its trained crews."

This preparatory committee hopes to have an arrangement with every group in the county. We just exactly what his area must do for itself.

"We've got to have this plan and we know that when the disaster hits, we will have."

Pruden, who will preside over the general sessions, said the keynote will be Arthur Jones of St. Louis, executive director for the mid-western area disaster service.

"I hope for a good attendance at the evening session Tuesday to open the institute," Pruden said.

"During the day sessions, Jones will meet with small groups for the purpose of discussing the sessions. The results of these conferences will give us material to be discussed in detail, overall plan at the closing session Tuesday."

"This does not mean that we don't have any of it," he hastened to add. "In 12 years, our enrollment has increased 15 percent. Yet incidents involving window breakage, breaking and entering and defacing of property seems to be held at about the same number as some years ago."
