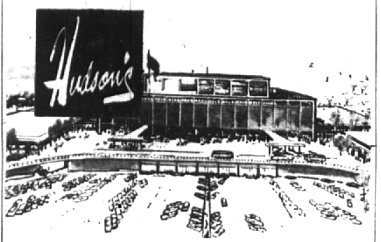
sandalwood dress worn by Mrs. Bosley.
