Buckridge also objected to the odor and unhealthiness of the muddy Rouge and asked that the river bed be inclosed.

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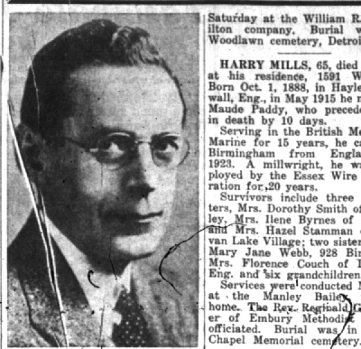

County Clerk Sees Bill Past House After Four Years

After four years in the legislative mill of Washington, D.C., a bill promoted by Lynn D. Allen, Oakland county clerk, has succeeded in passing through the U. S. House of Representatives.

The bill, a measure to increase the fee connected with securing visas for travel outside the United States, was sponsored in the House by Representative George A. Dandero, Royal Oak.

Allen said he suggested the bill to Dandero when it became apparent that the cost of processing visas was being defrayed under the present schedule of fees. The bill is designed to increase these fees from their present \$10 to \$12.

ALL COUNTY offices in which there is not a federal district court office provide visa service, Allen said.

The bill now is up for Senate confirmation, Allen said he has written Michigan Senators Homer Ferguson and Charles E. Potter for their support of the measure.

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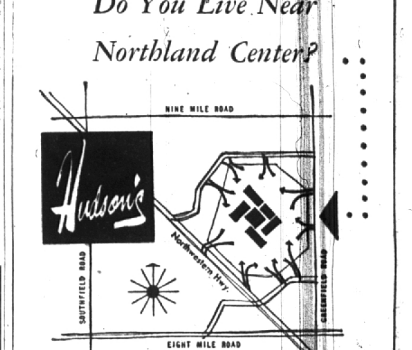
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
