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will not be required if the expansion does not exceed 15 percent of existing floor space, or less than 1,000 square feet. If these minimum expansion are exceeded, parking space must be provided on the one square foot formula for the entire expansion.

PARKING could be supplied in four ways in business districts: 1) By providing the required off-street parking on the same site as the building being served; 2) By providing the required off-street parking within 500 feet of the building being served; 3) By the collective provision of the required off-street parking for two or more buildings or uses; and 4) By the provision of off-street parking program approved by the city commission either by special assessment district or otherwise.

One provision in the proposed ordinance was deleted by the plan board Tuesday night. This provision would have required screening of business district parking lots that abut residential property.

JAMES SPENCER, plan board chairman, said it is not known when the screening ordinance will be brought up by the commission, but he added, it will be presented to the commission before its next meeting Monday night.

Also under discussion by the plan board was the creation of a new parking district to allow commercial parking lots in the business district. These lots could be operated on a fee basis.

The board ran into difficulty in attempting to arrive at a means of requiring screening for these proposed parking lots to protect adjacent residential properties.

SPENCER ordered Robert Boatman, city planning technician, to further study the proposal. Boatman will confer with City Attorney Forbes Hascall to see if

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tely which lasted as a place of refuge for so many years. The improvements made from time to time by its various owners nearly obliterated all traces of the old original house, but the old hotel stand still hold out a welcome to the wayfarer.

JOHN HAMILTON, who called his tavern "The Birmingham House," was succeeded in 1842 by John Davis, then Leman Fuller, Peter Box (in 1850's), Frank and David Curtis, E. R. King and R. H. Valentine, (under whose ownership the southern portion of the house containing the ball room was erected), A. C. Ellis, a Mr. Porter, Lewis Cantlin, George Ferguson and Martin D. Masters.

John Daines became the proprietor in 1854, according to one account, and upon his death in 1875, the management went to his son, George E. Daines.

Minnie Hunt Saltzer of Pontiac, an old time former Birmingham resident writes a word picture of the old hotel during the late 1880's.

"THE FIRST DOOR," she wrote, at the left of this picture accompanying this article, led into a hallway with the parlor in the northwest corner of the building and a public sitting room to the right of hall.

The second doorway led into the bar (also entered from the sitting room) where artists came painting the town red could be obtained.

In the center of the bar room was an iron post, extending from the ceiling to the floor. Persons who were sometimes handcuffed to this post until they could be taken to the county jail. Birmingham had no facilities at this time for their detention.

"THE SOUTHWEST corner of the building (third door) was rented to various people at various times for various purposes, Mrs. Sauter remembers when Mrs. Ed Lamb had a dressmaking establishment in this corner room.

Between the bar and the southwest corner room was a stairway leading up to the ballroom on the second floor. The ballroom was quite large and was entered through doors at either side of an orchestra gallery. Oil lamps with red shades were used to light the rooms of the hotel at this time.

Kerosene lamps were used throughout all of Birmingham at this time, as the days of acetylene gas had not as yet come and electric lights were many years away.

In next week's issue will be told the story of Birmingham's historic hotel when it was owned and operated by a village undertaker.
