African Warden to Speak

Discontinuing the traditional May breakfast of her International Relations class, Mrs. Ruth Shain has scheduled a special evening program for March 10.

At this time she will present Oliver Milton, a game warden whose territory includes 18,000 square miles of Africa.

Milton's section of the country has been made familiar to American readers and theater-goers through such works as "The Snows of Kilimanjaro" and "King Solomon's Mines." His appearance here,

at 8 p.m. in the Community House, will be open to the public.

"OUR SPEAKER" is not a hunter but a preserver of game," Mrs. Shain said. "He has made friends of manna throughout his vast area and, so far as possible, the animals which inhabit it."

"He has lectured in many places, giving his audiences the benefit of his rich fund of humorous and informative anecdotes. In addition to his personal experience, he brings with him color motion pictures of his life as a game warden in Tanganyika and East Africa.
