Also in the morning will be a meeting of all students interested in business staffs of publications. Judges and guests present will include Miss Ann White, advisor of Fordson publications, and pres-

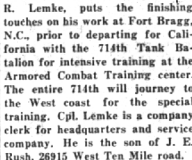
Fire Protection Topic of Realtors

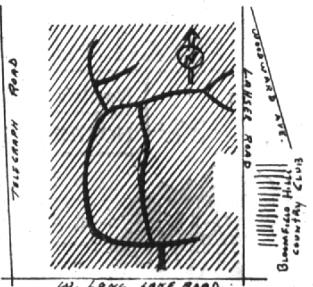

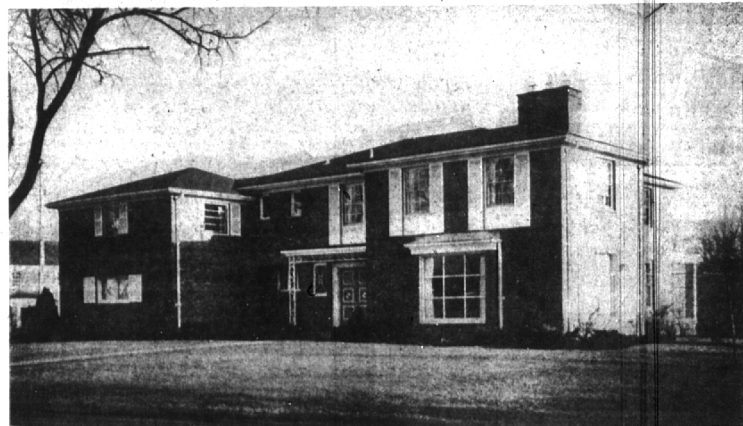
