China Mission Worker Will Be Baptists' Guest

A woman who began her missionary career in China in 1921, witnessed the Communist invasion of that country and returned to the States in 1952, will speak at the March 4 meeting of the Women's Mission Union, First Baptist church.

Katherine Bohn Luebeck prepared for missionary service at the training school for nurses of the Missouri Baptist sanitarium and Newton Theological seminary. Upon graduation she was named by the Woman's American Baptist Foreign Mission society to serve in South China, and took up her duties in Kiyang.

She married Dr. Luebeck in 1934, and for three years had charge of the Ungkuo hospital and directed women's work for that and the Chochoo district.

THE COUPLE returned to China in 1938, where Dr. Luebeck died in 1941.

Mrs. Luebeck's services since that time have been many and varied, including being a teacher and superintendent of nurses, hospital superintendent, local church work, tent evangelistic work, lectures on health, sanitation and hygiene.

She has done relief and rehabilitation work with refugees, country evangelistic work and prepared scripture tracts.

Through all her years abroad, she has constantly sought to prepare herself to do better work, taking special courses in three American institutes during furlough periods.

Each member is asked to bring some item for the display and present it with a brief story of its history.

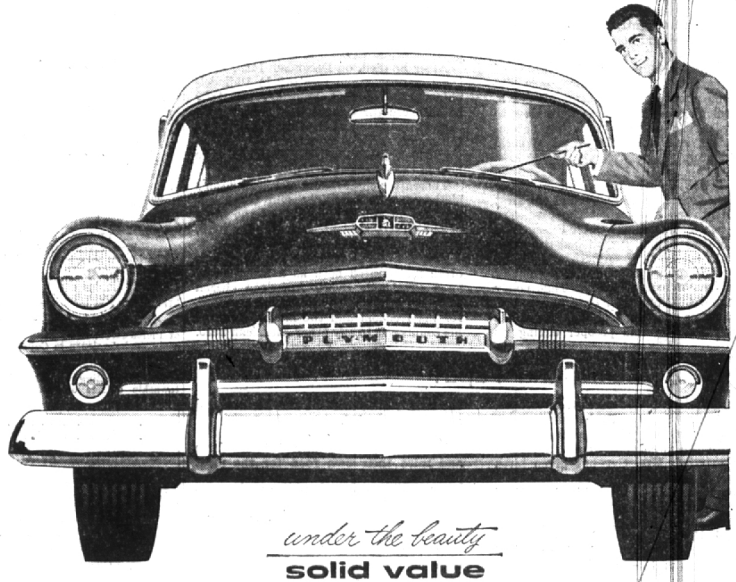

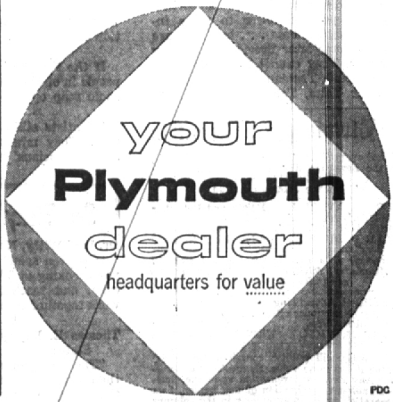
