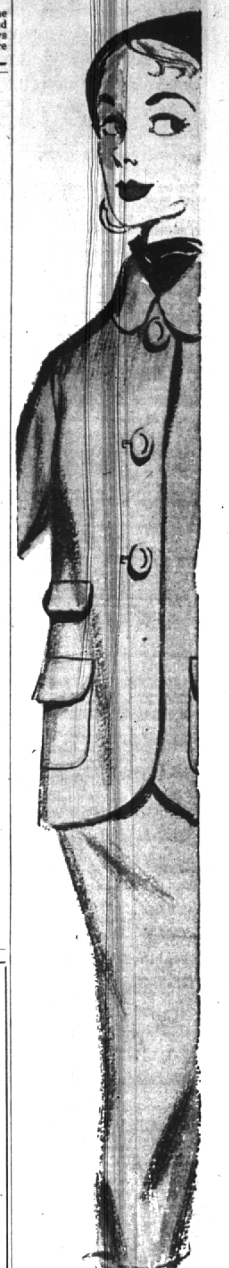
Mills College Group Skis at Badger Pass
