Lake LWV Sponsors Program of Interest

Dr. Dwight E. Ireland, superintendent of the Birmingham public schools, will be the speaker at the meeting of the Walnut Lake I.P.A., Feb. 8, at 8 p.m. at West Bloomfield Township hall. His subject will be "The Future of Our Schools."

Lake Huron is proposed as a source of water for Oakland County by William S. Broomfield, representative to the Michigan legislature from the Fourth district, one of the speakers at the Jan. 26 meeting of the West Bloomfield League of Women Voters.

Also speaking at this meeting on water supplies and sanitation were Dr. John Monroe, Oakland county director of public health, and H. Colston, director of sanitation for Oakland county. Broomfield, who has made a study of water supply pointed out that the constantly lowering water table has already produced a water shortage in some parts of the county and an additional source of water must soon be found.

Lake Huron, only 60 miles away, will be relatively uncontaminated, Broomfield said, even though St. Lawrence Seaway brings more industry to the Great Lakes. A question period following the talks showed much interest by residents in the problem of local lake pollution.

The Democratic and Republican candidates for representative to the Michigan legislature from the Third district, J. C. Westerdale and Richard M. Van Dusen, were introduced and spoke briefly. The election date is Thursday, Feb. 11.
