**To Make Special Calls On Business Newcomers**

Businessmen handling commercial and industrial solicitations in the forthcoming Community House Roll Call for 1954, met Jan. 29 for luncheon and to discuss campaign plans. Dexter Horton, who will direct this division, told the men he felt a more personal touch was needed this year, particularly among the newcomers to Birmingham's business life.

"We have a job ahead of us," he told them, "to tell these men and women what the Community House means to them and to our city as a whole. It's not simply a case of walk in, introduce ourselves, accept a check and walk out. We cannot expect new firms to support our enterprise if they do not know what it is."

"Ask them to visit the Community House and see how it operates. Tell them it is maintained by the city for everyone in the city and invite them and their families to join us."

"IN ADDITION," he said, "it might be well if these businessmen knew just exactly what the drawing power of the Community House is during their business hours. No one, new to Birmingham, can know the hundreds of persons who visit the House during business hours and become customers of local firms while they are in town."

Walter F. Skinner, general chairman, asked that special emphasis also be put on commercial places which have been loyal supporters in the past but apparently have been slack in recent Roll Calls.

Convicted of violating Birmingham's ordinance on taxicabs, Alex Portius, driver for the Veteran's Cab company, was fined \$5 on Wednesday, Jan. 27, by Birmingham Justice John J. Gaffill.

Portius was cited on the complaint of a local woman who said he picked up two other passengers without her consent after she had engaged the cab.

Under City ordinance, cab companies may not carry extra persons except with the consent of the first passenger, according to Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley. "I don't like to pay taxi rates for jitney service," the woman told Judge Gaffill.

**Snow-Draped Hydrant Has No Beauty**

The fire hydrant in front of your home becomes useless as fire protection if it has become buried with snow during heavy storm or by a snow plow clearing the streets.

While it is true that the fire department checks all 600 hydrants in the city on the average of twice a month during the winter, it is also true that they cannot visit every hydrant immediately following a heavy snow storm. It takes three or four days to get all of them.

Therefore, to keep this fire hydrant in front of your home as a vital operating part of fire protection, the fire department asks that you do not pile snow from the walk around and over the hydrant. Shovel snow away from the hydrant so it can be seen and readily available.

SEARCHING in the general area of a covered fire hydrant for a few minutes could mean the difference between loss of life and heavy destruction by fire instead of rapid control of fire and rescue of lives.

If there is no one in your household who could, or would, shovel out this hydrant, please take time to call the fire department. Give your house number and ask that the hydrant in front of your house be shoveled clear.

FIREMEN will appreciate this information and it will be a service to the community, particularly those homes served by this hydrant.

**Animal Pictures Show at Institute**

An adult pigmy shrew weighing less than a dime is one of several portraits of Michigan Mammals by Richard Philip Grossenheider, an exhibition of original watercolor and ink drawings now on view at Cranbrook Institute of Science.

Although Grossenheider studied the animals in their wild habitats, the portraits were made in the studio from living, freshly caught animals, from freshly killed specimens, from study skins and from zoo inmates. The works were originally drawn to illustrate Dr. William H. Burt's "The Mammals of Michigan," a book published by the University of Michigan Press. Grossenheider's portraits of the furry animals excel those by Audubon and Seton, in the opinion of Dr. Robert T. Hatt, director of the Institute.

The Institute Museum is open free to the public daily from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.

**Aborigines' Life Seen in Exhibit**

The boomerang inventors of Australia's kangaroo country are the subject of an exhibition on view at the museum of Cranbrook Institute of Science during the month of February.

The most complete exhibition yet made of the life of Australian Aborigines, the collection deals with native art, music, religion, food gathering, smoke signals, ceremonial dress and strange weapons like the boomerang and nulla nulla.

Inspired by the UNESCO policy of fostering world interest in the culture of little-known people, the exhibit illustrates the customs of one of the few peoples in the world whose life is still fairly close to the stone-age.

The institute museum is open free to the public daily from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.
