### Carters Enjoy Eggs in Dessert

Mothers, do you have difficulty in getting your family to eat eggs? Then feed them eggs without arguments by serving them this luscious dessert.

The recipe comes from the file of Mrs. Paul Carter, 385 Ferndale and calls for six eggs. A more delightful way of eating eggs cannot be imagined.

Mrs. Carter, whose husband is assistant superintendent of schools in charge of curriculum, is a busy mother with two young sons, John and Alan.

She finds time to teach the third grade Sunday school at the Methodist church and is also an active member of the Wesleyan group.

Since her son John is a Cub Scout, Mrs. Carter has served for the last two years as one of two mothers for Cub Scout Den 7, Troop B-8, Adams school. She is now on the board of the Adams school PTA as publications chairman.

Mrs. Carter, who has been married for 12 years, has three children and has been a member of the school where Paul Carter was once principal.

#### LEMON DESSERT

6 egg yolks 1½ teaspoon grated lemon rind  
¾ cup sugar ¼ cup water

Cook egg yolks and other ingredients in double boiler until it coats a spoon. Let cool. Soften 1 package Knox Gelatin in ¼ cup of cold water and add to custard. Beat six egg whites stiffly and add ¼ cup of sugar. Add this to first mixture.

Break 1 angel food cake (the size doesn't matter) into bite sized pieces and alternate in layers with the custard in a large tub pan.

Set in refrigerator to chill well. Serve with whipped cream. This will serve 12 people generously.
