AAUW Finance Class Is Open to Public

The Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women is endorsing the course of "Personal and Family Finance" to be presented by the adult education department of the Birmingham board of education. The course will begin Feb. 3 at the high school, and will continue for 10 weeks. Hours are from 8-10 p.m.

A portfolio on money management, available to AAUW members through national headquarters, will be useful in conjunction with the course. For some time, a club spokesman stated, the Birmingham AAUW has wanted to organize a study club on this subject. "It will be recalled," she said, "that a little more than a year ago, our organization held a 'money management' symposium to acquaint members with the handling of legal and financial matters.

"SIX SPEAKERS were heard during this all-day meeting and, as a result of the interest created

here, we have had many requests for a more extensive course." Mrs. William H. Jackson, chairman of the committee on legal status of women, has met with Richard Featherstone of the adult education division, and members of the Wayne University faculty to plan the current course. Among the subjects to be covered will be planning day-to-day expenditures for most effective saving; your financial servants stressing what banks and other institutions offer in the way of service.

INSURANCE, life, casualty, robbery, personal liability and other forms will occupy one evening; building an estate, not only to protect dependents but for retirement years, is another phase to be studied. Home selection and management and the partnership with the government, local, state and national, on the basis of taxes and social security will complete the course.

Mrs. Jackson said the proposed course is fully backed by AAUW with members having had the opportunity to enroll at the luncheon meeting Jan. 13.

The entire course is open to the public with a special emphasis placed on its importance for a joint subject for both husbands and wives.
