B of E Seeks To Condemn Troy Land

With one hand guiding land condemnation proceedings and the other hand pushing a study of school building needs, Birmingham board of education members decided Tuesday night to make a determination to win the land acquisition race with area developers.

In the past five years of school site studies, the school district has been faced with ever-increasing costs on land but Tuesday night they learned just how expensive land can be.

For the past two months the board of education has been negotiating with the Birmingham Development company to purchase a 20-acre parcel of land in Troy township bounded by Adams, Derby, the Grand Truck railroad and the City of Birmingham.

The board intends to acquire the land for a playground for Adams school and an Elementary school site.

AT THE OUTSET, the school board offered Arthur Nechman, head of the firm, \$1250 an acre for the parcel and this offer was refused. Last week Nechman made his final offer to the board, \$4.75 an acre—nearly four times the amount board appraisers had valued the land.

Board members also learned that the parcel north of Derby, also owned by the Birmingham Development company, was sold last week to a Detroit building firm for the \$4,750-an-acre price.

Lathrup Council Studies Rubbish, Water Operations

Lathrup Village city councilmen Monday night learned of the city's expected responsibility in the operation of the South Oakland County Water Authority's proposed supplementary water system.

Councilman John G. Campbell reported that Lathrup's share of the cost would probably be somewhere between \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year for between a million and 1 1/2 million gallons of water a day.

Half of the yearly fund would be paid in cash by the city while the remainder would come from water bill revenue, he stated.

Commenting on the possibility of the authority previous to the incorporation of Lathrup, contracted for 6 1/2 million gallons of water a day and figured Lathrup's needs would be nearly a sixth of this figure.

The board elected to call a special meeting if necessary to take the time to study the condemnation request before its February meeting.

Lathrup Tables Plan Commission Ordinance For Now

LATHRUP—in the longest discussion of a quiet meeting, Lathrup city councilmen Monday night argued the advantages and disadvantages of a planning commission and then voted three to two to table the proposed ordinance indefinitely.

Councilman Kathryn Feyereisen touched off the debate by asking that the ordinance, which had its first reading last week, be tabled because of opposition to it by a nine-man commission.

Miss Feyereisen stated that in her opinion there was no particular need for a planning body now, but admitted that the subject might be given serious thought sometime in the future.

Councilman Thomas Reed and John G. Campbell supported the need for the commission, stating that the council did not have the time to study planning and added that the commission would enable a larger segment of Lathrup's residents to express their opinion on the city's development.

Jaycees to Name Man of the Year At Jan. 27 Meet

At the Jan. 27 meeting of the Birmingham Jaycee Chapter of Commerce, the distinguished service award will be presented to the member of that organization, naming him "the outstanding young man of Birmingham for 1953."

The ceremony will bring to a climax activities of the annual Jaycee week, and reveal the name of the young man selected.

The award is based on general good citizenship, including such things as the man's religious and civic activities in his community.

FOUNDED in 1947, the local chapter has taken part in numerous affairs, widely known, being the Post-Caravan for European Peoples. This project snowballed into a national affair, resulting in tons of foodstuffs being sent to victims of World War II.

Repeat programs of the Birmingham Jaycees have included their sponsorship of the Christmas home lighting contest in 1952-53 and the Post-Age Roden of last year. That event is on the 1954 agenda with hopes of an even bigger schedule of events.
