

Speech Contest Enters 2nd Week

Winner of the first week is John Neill, 410 Benvaile, club president, whose speech entitled "Toward World Understanding," told of the efforts an individual citizen can make toward world understanding and thereby world peace. William Andrews' speech "My Most Unforgettable Moment," related his experiences in finding himself alone in a strange railroad station in Calcutta, India, during World War II.
