

Polio March Covers Entire School District

Altered schedules for the 1954 Mothers March on Polio will see these women take to the field throughout the entire Birmingham school district on Jan. 28, from 7 to 8 p.m.

As in the past, the lighted porchlight will be the signal that solicitors will be welcomed at that particular home. Besides homes within the City of Birmingham, lights will shine in the nearby communities of Wing Lake, Foxcroft, Franklin and Walnut Lake.

"No goal has been set," Chairman John B. Taylor said this week. "Instead, we depend on the eagerness of our area residents to keep on supporting the scientists who have become its victims.

We depend on the sympathy our residents have for those families who have polio patients among their members and are not able to face the whole financial burden without help.

"OUR PEOPLE," he added, "know from the past how the National Foundation has reached into our section when polio has struck. To some, this drive will be a payment for services rendered. To others it may be considered as a form of insurance. Either way, I know Birmingham and the surrounding communities, will not stop now. Not when possible victory is in sight."
