

Head-on Smashup Injures Three

Three persons were hospitalized as the result of a two-car, head-on collision on Woodward near Trowbridge in Bloomfield Hills Monday night.

Injured were George Bass, 48, of Oxford, sole occupant of one of the cars; Miss Betty Musgrove, 19, and Clifton O. Gates, 30, both of Detroit. The occupants of the other car, Bloomfield Hills Police Chief I. C. Banks said that because of the injuries, a clear account of the accident has not been given.

It HAS BEEN established that Bass was driving north in the northbound lane of Woodward, but it is not known for certain who was driving the other car, or whether it was being driven south in the northbound lane, or whether it had just entered Woodward from Trowbridge.

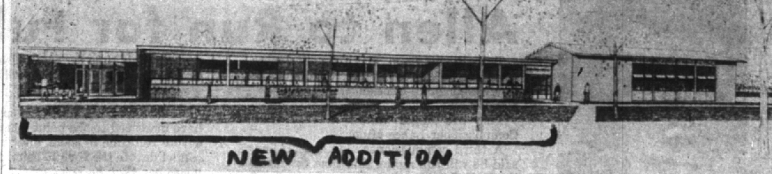

BIDS ON THE ADDITION to Wing Lake school will be received by the Bloomfield Hills board of education at a special meeting at Vaughan school, Wednesday night, Feb. 3. The addition will provide four new elementary class rooms, multi-purpose room, kitchen, health clinic and administration offices. Funds for construction of the school were assured by the sale of \$1,750,000 worth of bonds by the district on Jan. 20. Superintendent of Schools Eugene

L. Johnson said the bid for sale of the bonds was pleasingly low. The bonds were bought by Blyth and Co. of New York with local associates at an average interest price of 2.26 per cent. Expected to be completed at a cost of \$225,000 and in time for classes next fall, the school will appear as pictured above in an artist's sketch. Remainder of the funds from the bond sale will be used to construct a 22-room high school on Long Lake road.

Feb. 15 Date Set to Launch '54 Roll Call

Final plans for the 1954 Community House Roll Call are being whipped into shape this week preparatory to launching the \$45,000 drive on Feb. 15.

On Friday the businessmen's division will meet for luncheon at the Community House and discuss details of their campaign. The captains' luncheon is scheduled for Feb. 11, when area leaders will make any minor revisions necessary in their plans and ready themselves to instruct their scores of solicitors.

Walter F. Skinner, Roll Call chairman, emphasized again that mailed donations would ease the burden of solicitors, as names would be taken off calling lists as soon as the money is received. He asked, too, that families planning to leave on extended vacations, mail their contributions directly to the Community House as soon as possible.

IN A LETTER to Birmingham residents, Skinner said any contribution, large or small, would be a tribute to the regard in which the Community House is held. "These small amounts," he said, "show us that the people we consider our neighbors are behind us. Skinner pointed out that the increase in the budget was not wholly due to rising prices for commodities, but mainly to the greater demands of the House's time and facilities."

"We have just ended a record year," he said, "and it appears are facing another. The House is here

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Planners Review Zoning Proposal

Changes to certain provisions of the proposed old street parking amendment to Birmingham's zoning ordinance came up before the city's plan board at its meeting Tuesday night. City commissioners had asked the board to clarify certain provisions of the amendment and to study certain possible changes.

Questions before the board were: (1) Shall there be a minimum-sized business establishment that would be exempted from the amendment? (2) Should firms reconstructing present business buildings be required to provide more parking? (3) Should a new parking district classification be written into the amendment to apply to situations where business firms combine to provide off-street parking?

IN DISCUSSING the first question, Board Member Harry Denyes said that he felt small business property owners should be exempted from the necessity of providing parking when developing their property. Denyes said that forcing a small business to provide parking would be impractical. "Under the amendment if the owner of a twenty foot lot such as those existing on S. Woodward, decides to build a store, he will have to provide parking equivalent to his retail floor space pointed out before."

BOARD MEMBER George Green took an opposite stand and asked, "A lot of the residential parking south end of Woodward, where these small lots exist, go without parking." "If we do," he continued, "Cars will park in the residential areas and blight surrounding neighborhoods."

Board members voted to let the amendment stand as is, with no provision for classification for small businesses. Denyes and Board Chairman James H. Spencer cast dissenting votes.

On the second question, the board voted to exempt present business buildings that would be subsequently reconstructed from the necessity of providing additional parking. However, a minimum amount of expansion involved in the reconstruction would be allowed without provision for added parking space.

NO ACTION was taken on the third question that of writing in a provision to establish a new parking district classification. This involves areas in which business groups have developed parking facilities.

For instance, the Wabeck-Jacobson sponsoring group has arranged for parking facilities in the north-northwest quadrant. What the board is trying to decide is whether a business in the quadrant which is not a member of the group can expand without adding parking facilities. Or whether, once parking is provided for a quadrant, businesses in the area should provide more parking when they expand.
