Issue of Aug. 27
Dry weather has prompted city commissioners to revive restrictions on the use of city water. Fire Chief Vern Griffith reported to the commission Monday night that citizens' efforts to save their parched lawns were running water

reserves dangerously low. The restrictions require that residents in even-numbered houses may water their lawns only on even-numbered days, while residents in odd-numbered may use odd-numbered days, only, for sprinkling.

Walter D. Pannell, 55, manager of Michigan Bell's Birmingham area, died suddenly Monday, Aug. 24, following a heart attack. He had worked for the telephone company in Birmingham since 1926.

Financing of the South Oakland County Garbage and Rubbish authority's incinerator was assured Friday, Aug. 21, when officials completed the sale of \$1,500,000 in bonds. The 450-ton-a-day incinerator will service Birmingham as well as other areas.

A group of 25 Birmingham business and professional men have banded together to form a new chapter of Civitan International, well known men's service club. Initial step was taken Tuesday night when the group met and voted to petition the international for a charter. Hugh McDuckie, of Harold Turner, Inc. was elected as temporary president.

In preparation for the opening of schools in the Birmingham school district, Dr. Dwight B. Ireland, superintendent, announced that a pre-school conference covering four days will commence Sept. 1. The conference is to be conducted to help teachers to familiarize themselves with the program for the coming year.

Issue of Sept. 3
Facilities of public and parochial schools in and around Birmingham are bracing for opening day when an estimated 15,852 students will storm the entrances of schools in the area. Enrollments will be up 10 percent over last June's totals. School administrators are searching about for ways and means of housing the 1,332 student increase, while building projects are being rushed.

With continued dry weather, Birmingham's water supply has reached the critical stage. Storage tanks are running dangerously low during peak periods of demand. Fire Chief Vern Griffith has urged the cooperation of all citizens in an effort to conserve water.

The prisoner exchange in far off Korea was brought nearer home this week with the news that two Southfield township men were released by the Chinese Reds on Aug. 27. The men are Cpl. Clifford Ayotte and Sgt. Richard Waverly, both of whom had been held by the Reds for nearly three years.

The Bloomfield Hills board of education decided at a meeting Sept. 1 to prepare plans for a new high school to accommodate from 600 to 800 students. Site of the proposed new high school is a portion of the George Estate on Long Lake road west of Telegraph. Birmingham has taken seventh place in the National Safety Council's ranking of 407 cities in its category. The competition based on a system of points from Birmingham scoring 719.7 points out of a possible 1000. An honorable mention plaque was presented to the city for its record.

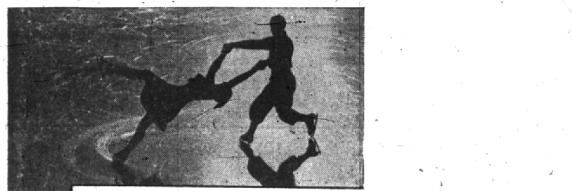

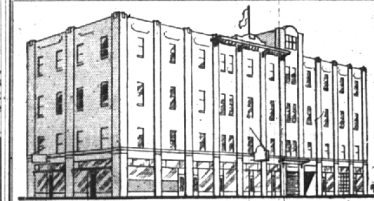
