associated with the National Institute of Family Relations of Los Angeles, as a counsellor.

In addition he holds and has held several offices in the YMCA and its fields and is a member of the mayor's committee for the rehabilitation of narcotics addicts.

The Forum, taught by Earl B. Bramblett, will be presided over Friday by Edward C. Anderson. A social hour and refreshments will follow the program.
