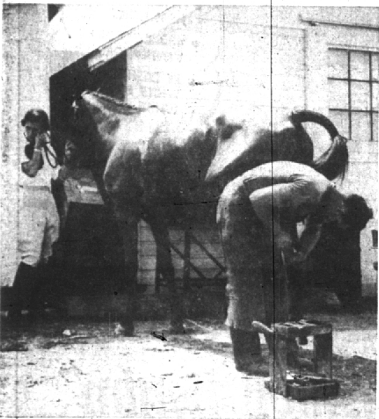

## Varied Scenes Of Activity at Open Hunt Club

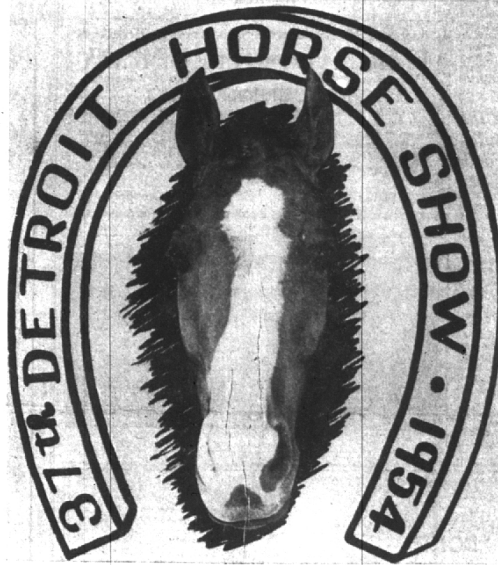


Mrs. Reese Howard, Mrs. Irving Duffy and Mrs. Carleton Huhie converse at judges' stand.

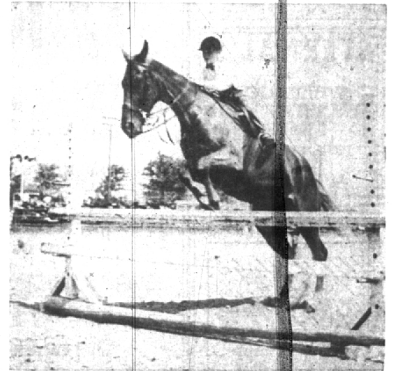
