

# Annual Meetings of Wing Lake Property Owners Assns. Held

WING LAKE—At the annual meeting of the Wing Lake Property Owners Association, Inc., June 8, the following motions were among those made and carried by a majority of the stockholders present.

Elected to the board of directors for two year terms were Haydon Bohner, Richard Garlick and James Wright.

A vote of thanks was tendered to James Wright for his work on association stock and related records; to Parbury Schmidt and Floyd Schneider for work done as members of the board of trustees and officers of the association and to Elwood Engel for his work in transferring to the capital fund in order to provide for such a contingency as the necessity for a new well.

The association will hold at least two or three meetings a year. Members indicated that they have no objection to the island area improvement along the general lines explained by Albert Remington.

Reports were made by various committees. Albert Remington, chairman of the park improvement committee, made up of E. Aikens, Glen James and Randall Crabb, reported that a preliminary examination by an engineer from the Huron-Clinton Authority has already determined that there is an excellent potential for a beach on the west side of the island.

Owing to the great difference between contractors' price proposals for beach work, the committee decided that expert advice should be obtained. An engineering consultant from the Huron-Clinton Authority they developed Metropolitan Beach at Lake St. Clair.

It is to make a complete survey to determine exactly how to proceed with the project and, how much it would cost.

Alfred Kasameyer, chairman of the water committee, reported that work on the installation of new mains to relieve sand and rust conditions had to be deferred due to wet weather during May and the delay in delivery of pipe to the contractor. Work should commence within two weeks.

He also reported that the association has a contract with a firm for servicing the wells and mains in the event of breaks. This firm recently stated that the level of water in the wells is satisfactory and the pumps in good operating condition. Kasameyer pointed out the need for reduced use of water during peak periods in order to maintain pressure in the homes of those living some distance from the wells.

Mrs. William Warner, chairman of the park beautification committee, called upon members to teach their children to appreciate the work being done and to keep the park area and other areas of the subdivision neat and orderly.

Following the meeting, the trustees met and elected James Wright, president; Alfred Kasameyer, vice president; Albert Remington, secretary and Richard Garlick, treasurer.

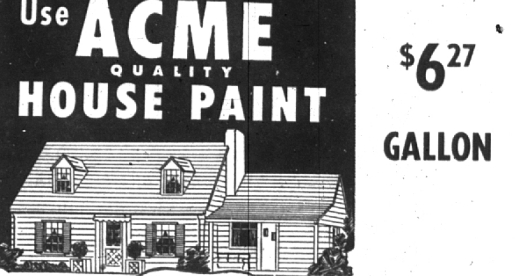
Your past support is greatly appreciated and, we hope, will be still forthcoming in the future.
