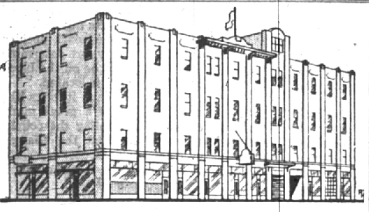

The City Commission of the City of Birmingham will meet Tuesday, July 6th, 1954, at 8 o'clock P.M. in the Commission Room in the Municipal Building to consider any objections to the construction of certain improvements on St. Andrews-Pembroke to Derby, described herein and to the creation of a special assessment district, created to defray the cost of construction of:

1. A foot sidewalk extending from Pembroke to Derby; a drain extending from the rear lot line to Derby; a curb at the north edge of the concrete pavement return on Pembroke; and the relocation of the power poles to the easement retained.
