Examining her Friday were Drs. L. Jerome Fink and Maurice Williams, both of Pontiac, who were opposed to the task by Oakland County Prosecutor Frederick C. Ziem.

MRS. HOWITT'S HUSBAND, Clyde, told police that his wife had been upset since her 18-year-old son by a previous marriage, Jack Ott, had left home three weeks ago.

He said Mrs. Howitt had asked to keep the car on the day of the tragedy and had planned to

meet him at 3:30 p.m. when he finished work as a toolmaker at an 8-Mile road plant.

He told police he tried to call his wife when she didn't show up but got no answer. He then called her father, Edward Howitt, 2773 Thirteenth Mile, who discovered the tragedy shortly after 7 p.m.

POLICE notified first of the tragedy, immediately called in the fire department's rescuistator squad, which brought Mrs. Howitt to in about half an hour.

Funeral services for James were held Monday from the Bell Chapel of the William R. Hamilton company. Burial was in White Chapel Memorial cemetery.
