

### Studying New Traffic Ticket

A new traffic ticket, designed to reduce clerical costs, is being studied for possible adoption by the Birmingham police department, Chief Ralph W. Moxley said this week.

An extra page would be added to the new ticket for use as an abstract of record that in moving violation cases, must be mailed to the records bureau of the department of State in Lansing. The back of another page is designed for use as a court record.

These features would save a great deal of extra typing necessary with tickets presently used, Moxley said.

If after study the new tickets seem feasible, their use will be recommended, he added.

### Prison Inmates Offer Advice On Delinquency

An interview with inmates of Jackson prison has convinced Lt. Henry Timm of the Birmingham police department that yesterday's juvenile offenders could be a good source of ideas for use today's efforts to control juvenile delinquency.

Timm participated in the interview of 43 Jackson inmates as part of a four-day training course he recently completed at Michigan State College's school of continuing education.

All the inmates were up for parole and were living in the prison's unique rehabilitation center outside prison walls. Many of the men had long prison records, and all had records as juvenile offenders.

WHEN ASKED what advice they had for persons engaged in seeking solutions to juvenile problems, the prisoners freely offered suggestions, Timm reports.

Parental love and understanding and a healthy home environment topped the list of things the prisoners felt would best serve as deterrents to juvenile delinquency.

Inmates blame parents for today's increasing juvenile problems and said the lack of home companionship is causing many children to stray.

"Most of the prisoners said they had no church affiliations as children and felt strongly that if they had attended church, their life histories may have been different. They all stressed that parents should attend church with their children where they can learn more about proper living," said Timm.

SPECIAL ATTENTION for problem children in schools, no matter what the cost, is a vital necessity, the prisoners said.

Juvenile homes and vocational schools for youthful offenders were frowned on in general by the inmates, said Timm.

"One prisoner suggested a special quarantine ward in Jackson prison be set up to accommodate youthful law breakers. He said a short experience behind the prison walls could very well impress a youngster with the advantages of living within the law," Timm related.

CRIME SHOWS on television and radio also were criticized. Prisoners said all such shows should start with the message that crime does not pay rather than triumph.

being allowed to run through 25 minutes before law and order triumphs.

Efforts of law enforcement agencies should be devoted entirely to correction rather than punishment of juvenile offenders, Timm quoted the inmates as saying.
