Speaking before the Birmingham Kiwanis club last week, Oswald C. White of the Michigan Bell public relations offices, told the group that Americans take their freedoms too much for granted.

"Your freedoms will be yours just so long as Mr. Average Citizen fights for it," he told them.

White said he believed there is a definite drift toward socialism through the constant demand and increase of the security provided by the federal government.

"In this respect," he declared, "Americans are selling their birthright of freedom for a guaranteed security. I believe 'guaranteed security' is an inevitable prelude to a police state in which there is no freedom—and no security."

They also confirmed Monday night the \$800 special assessment for a half block of sidewalk from Villa south on what used to be Yankee street before it was vacated several years ago.

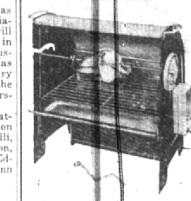

Brazilian Exhibit To Be Displayed At Art Academy

Brazilian landscape architecture, which has risen to world-wide prestige during the past twenty years, will be illustrated through the work of Roberto Burle Marx, its leading pioneer, in an exhibit to be on view from July 16 August 15 at the Museum of Cranbrook Academy of Art, according to an announcement by Eva I. Gaitling, curator of the museum.

As a gardener himself, Burle Marx raises luxuriant plants and arranges them into a growing interplay of free forms and spaces, in color, color and relating, then to the interiors and exteriors of the buildings in a "live" sculptural effect.

The exhibit consists of 35 watercolor of garden design, 75 photographs of gardens and their related buildings, a selection of printed fabrics and a panel of ceramic tiles.

WHEN PLANNING a garden, Marx considers the entire layout as a single unit, so that his large multi-colored plans resemble abstract paintings. A close look, however, will reveal them as exact landscape architectural layouts for private homes and gardens, airports and public centers. A series of photographs accompanying the panels show the scope of the project.
