Family Favorites
Bean Creole for Sunday Affair
Entertaining at a Sunday night supper? Perhaps you might like to try this Bean Casserole which comes from the recipe file of Mrs. John Chapman, Jr., 1720 Dorchester.
She has made it many times for a Sunday night affair and says that it is a dish that men like as well as women.
While the list of ingredients looks rather long, the dish is not difficult to put together. Mrs. Chapman said that the casserole may be mixed together the day before, put into the refrigerator and then baked before the company arrives.
She has also made it and put it in the freezer for future use. The flavor is retained during the freezing process, although the beans are likely to break up a little.

BEAN CREOLE
1/2 pound raw ham, sliced in thin strips
1 medium chopped onion
1 clove minced garlic
1 No. 2 can green lima beans, drained
1 No. 2 can kidney beans, drained and rinsed
1 No. 2 can baked beans without tomato sauce
1/2 cup ketchup
3 tablespoons vinegar
3 tablespoons water
1 teaspoon prepared mustard
1 tablespoon brown sugar
salt and pepper
Trim fat from ham, fry out in skillet. Add ham and fry in fat. Add onions and garlic and cook 5 minutes. Add remaining ingredients. Mix carefully with fork so that beans will not break up. Heat thoroughly and turn into a casserole. If you wish, you may put a layer of sauteed onions on top. Bake covered at 350 degrees for 45-60 minutes. The recipe serves six to eight people.
