Mrs. Bernard Magruder, of the Birmingham League of Women Voters and Mrs. John Rumsey, voters service chairman of the State League of Women Voters, both residents of Franklin, have just completed the tremendous undertaking of preparing voters guides, covering the primary election of August 3.

Covering two proposals and all of the candidates for 19 Oakland county and state offices, and including the offices of U. S. senator and representatives from Michigan and other league workers. The guides are the result of personal interviews of the candidates by these two Franklin women and other league workers. The guides were prepared in conjunction with the League's units in West Bloomfield, Pontiac, Royal Oak, Ferndale and Pleasant Ridge.
