

2 Detroit Women Given 60 Days in Jail, Costs

Jail sentences of 60 days each, plus payment of \$25 court cost, were ordered for two Detroit women Monday by Birmingham Justice John J. Gafliff after they had pleaded guilty to charges of simple larceny.

Charged with taking a shirt and three men's undershirts from the Eggleston store, 136 N. Woodward, were Mrs. Evelyn Myers, 53, of

118 Virginia Park, and Mrs. Mona J. Dingley, 68, of 59 Seward. They were apprehended by Birmingham police then released later Saturday after posting \$100 bond each.

IN COURT Monday, neither woman could offer an explanation for taking the articles when it was disclosed they had sufficient funds on their person at the time of arrest to pay for every item found in their possession.

They declared this was their first offense and unknown to their husbands, neither of whom attended the trial.

Mrs. Myers said she had a son living in Detroit and a husband who earned \$7,000 yearly as vice-president of an oil company.

MRS. DINGLEY said she had a daughter living in Louisville, Ky., and an ailing husband who was unable to work regularly. She said she was employed in an advertising saleswoman for a church publishing company.

Miss Joann Humphries, 2872 Adams, the Eggleston employee responsible for the arrest, declared she spotted Mrs. Myers picking up a shirt. She followed the women out of the store, then lost track of them.

Later she spotted them returning and followed them a second time. This time she traced the women to their car in the Wakeback parking lot and called police who made the arrest.

ACCORDING TO Mrs. Dingley's testimony the women had visited Birmingham a week earlier and taken a pound of bacon. She said Mrs. Myers was without a car, since her husband was on vacation and had taken his car with him. They maintained their decision to return to Birmingham was incidental to "going for a drive."

After Judge Gafliff announced the sentence, the women pled that they were permitted to pay a heavier fine and make restitution rather than serve out a jail sentence, but the judge refused clemency.

They have 10 days in which to appeal their case.

State Asks Bids For Separation Of 8-Mile, U.S. 10

The state highway department will take bids on July 28 in Lansing for the construction of a large grade separation at Woodward avenue (U.S. 10) and Eight-Mile road, Highway Commissioner Charles M. Ziegler announced this week.

The Woodward-avenue-Eight Mile road intersection handles some 150,000 vehicles every 24-hour period, making it the busiest highway intersection in the state.

Construction of the grade separation estimated to cost \$3,500,000, will permit a constant and even flow of traffic on both Woodward avenue and 8-Mile road and eliminate heavy traffic congestion which now exists.

UNDER TERMS of the contract to be made with the low bidder on the project, construction work is to be completed by December 15, 1955.

The Woodward-8 Mile structure will be one of the largest highway grade separations ever built in Michigan. It will be a tri-level structure, with the ground level used for turning movements. Woodward avenue traffic will go over the ground level and 8 Mile traffic will go under the grade level.
