1/2 cup blanched shredded almonds

Dissolve gelatin in the hot water. Chill until slightly thickened. Add crabmeat, pineapple, celery and almonds. Turn into individual greased molds. When time to serve, unmold on lettuce and serve with mayonnaise.

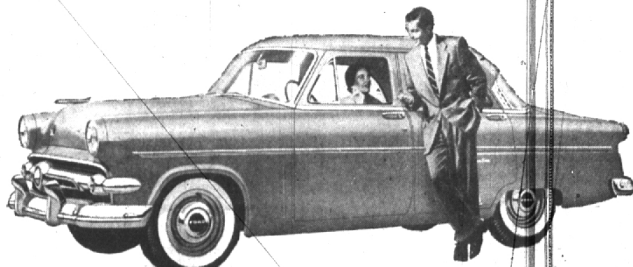
