this figure could be upped to 8,000,000 gallons per day. A third step in the program is to provide water treatment for Birmingham well water so that it will mix satisfactorily with Detroit water.

PROPOSED plans call for erection of a treatment plant along the southern border of the city to treat water from both the Southfield and Wakefield wells. These two wells now are producing between 50 and 60 percent of the city's entire supply and it is intended to maintain these two wells and gain the remaining quantity of water from the City of Detroit.

Commissioners learned that the proposed improvements could be financed by either revenue bonds or general obligation bonds.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert recommended the use of obligation bonds which draw a lesser interest rate and are easier for the city to pay under.

PRESENT thinking on the part of city officials is that the entire debt can be paid off by revenues within the water department.

The engineering studies will take months to complete, City Engineer L. R. Gare indicated, but he advised that work has started immediately so that the city will be in a position to accept Detroit water into a completed system.

consumed during a 12-hour period Saturday exceeds all former daily pumping records, Smith said.

For the past 10 days, the daily consumption has averaged 4,800,000 gallons, he said.

OUNDING OF the alarm early in the evening for the past few days, Smith told commissioners Monday night, has resulted in some relief to city pumping demands, but he declared better progress could be made if more citizens would cooperate with the emergency.

"Saturday night, following the alarm, a man from our department went around town asking people to cease their sprinkling," Smith pointed out. "Most householders complied, but the moment our fellow was out of sight, some turned the water back on, he found out when he immediately came back around the block again. There were 12 such instances in the northwest part of the city alone."

COMMISSIONERS recognized the city had an ordinance which could be called upon to assist enforcement of water conservation measures—but they were reluctant to tell police or firemen to start handing out violation tickets.

The ordinance provides for up to a \$100 fine, or 90 days in jail, or both.

Both Democrats and Republicans are running only one candidate for the remainder of the county offices with the exception of the county's surveyor post, sought only by Republican Omar E. MacNutt. Democrats are Neil R. Cresse for county clerk; Donald E. Barrett for county treasurer; Hazel A. Kuchsky for register of deeds; and Glenn D. Harper for drain commissioner.

REPUBLICANS include Lynn D. Allen, county clerk; Charles A. Sparks, county treasurer; Orrin McQuaid, register of deeds; and Ralph A. Main, drain commissioner.

One confusing factor to many voters is that they cannot split their ticket between Republicans and Democratic candidates on the primary election.

Split balloting is allowed only at the final election.

Application for absentee voters ballots must be in the hands of the clerk by Saturday, July 31, by 2 p.m.

The Birmingham League of Women Voters again plans to distribute some 5,000 copies of the voter's guide in local stores and by mail this weekend.
